AROUND THE STATEHOUSE...

The Ohio legislature began its spring break this week and will return to the statehouse the week of April 17. Much of the Ohio House and Senate's focus has been on the budget bills that come at the start of each new General Assembly (this year marks the beginning of the 135th G.A.)

Last week, the Transportation Budget (HB 23) was passed and signed into law. The \$13.5 billion budget, Ohio's largest transportation budget ever, incorporates significant federal dollars that includes funding for the Brent Spence Bridge. A heated policy debate involved the local governments' force accounts monetary thresholds, which were ultimately increased by 133 percent thanks to a last-minute compromise between local government groups and the Ohio Contractors Association (OCA).

While the state's capital (or bricks and mortar) spending bill is introduced on even years, the two-year Operating Budget Bill (HB 33) incorporates a significant amount of capital and infrastructure investments and policy of interest to the construction industry. They include:

- OFCC, Career Tech/Joint Vocational School Facilities Program upgrades to training centers and equipment grants (\$200 million total); funding for additional OFCC staff
- All-Ohio Future Fund, \$2.4 billion: Site development/infrastructure, provide shovel-ready sites across the state
- Jail Improvements, \$50 Million
- Veterans Homes Upgrades, \$65 million: covers 1/3 of the project cost, remainder will be covered by federal funding
- Expo Improvements (upgrade state fairgrounds) \$190 million for design work; if proposal and planned future funding is approved, it will be the largest capital improvement in state history



The massive budget totals nearly \$200 billion in all funds that are mostly combination of general revenue fund spending (\$86 billion) and a variety of one-time federal funds. AGC has expressed support for the capital investments and efforts to expand career tech/JVS to address the needs of in-demand careers like construction. The association is also trying to prevent the inclusion of problematic provisions during the budget's deliberations.

The Ohio House is expected to make significant spending and policy changes to the budget this month. It will then move to the Senate where that chamber will put its mark on the legislation. From there the bill will inevitably proceed to a Conference Committee, where key legislators from the House and Senate will hammer out the differences – choosing between the Executive, House or Senate proposals.

Other bills of interest in which AGC of Ohio has been engaged are:

- Cooperative Purchasing, S.B. 23 (Lang, R-West Chester). *AGC Action: Oppose. Testified in opposition, legislator outreach, coalition effort*
- Expedited Building Appeals, S.B. 41 (Roegner, R-Hudson). *AGC Action: Support, worked with sponsors to amend to prevent overloading appeals boards and provided testimony supporting updated language. Bill recently was voted out of committee.*
- Prompt Pay (private owner to contractor). AGC Action: Support. Joint effort with subcontractors, will be reintroduced in House soon.
- Digital Repairs/Right to Repair, S.B. 73 (Blessing, R-Colerain Twp). AGC Action: Oppose in part. Provided testimony describing unintended consequences related to hi-tech construction equipment and requested an exclusion for construction equipment.

NEW OHIO DISTRACTED DRIVING LAW GOES INTO EFFECT

As of April 4, it is illegal to use or hold a cell phone or electronic device in your hand, lap, or other parts of the body while driving on Ohio roads. If an officer sees a violation, they can pull you over.

Under the new law, drivers over 18 years old can make or receive calls via hands-free devices, including: speakerphone, earpiece, wireless headset, electronic watch, and connecting phone to vehicle. In most cases, anything more than a single touch or swipe is against the law. Drivers can listen to audio streaming apps and use navigational equipment if they turn them on before getting on the road or use a single touch or swipe to activate, modify, or deactivate them. Drivers under the age of 18 remain restricted from using their devices in any way, including hands-free features.

There are several exceptions to the law, and law enforcement will issue warnings for violations over the first six months to educate and help motorists adapt to the new law. Beginning October 5, 2023, law enforcement will start issuing citations for violations.

The state of Ohio has created a website and tool kit to inform the public and provide resources to help employers educate their employees.
